MINUTES August 13th, 2018 WORK SESSION START: 7:30 PM

Mayor Nicol announced that any member of the public wishing to audio or video record a Council Meeting must give notice to the Borough Clerk prior to the meeting being recorded.

Mayor Nicol convened the work session in compliance with the Open Public Meetings Act and recognized the Administrator requested permission to add two resolutions to the consent agenda.

The first, 18-99-H was a Chapter 159 Resolution to make the \$235,000 grant received from NJDOT available to fund the award of the bid for Valley Road Phase II Improvements (18-99-C). The funds were not included in the 2018 budget and the resolution was therefore required.

The second 18-99-I resulted from the fact that Resolution 18-99-F had to be bi-furcated. The regulations require two resolutions. One to authorize the submission by H2M and a second resolution to authorize the Administrator to sign the application on behalf of the Borough. Both matters are essentially "house-keeping"

Council gave their authorization.

There being no questions from Council or the public, work session was adjourned at 7:35 p.m. on a motion by Councilman Shaak seconded by Councilman Nolan.

Mayor Nicol then announced that the time had arrived for a hearing and further consideration of "AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER THIRTEEN OF THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF BRIELLE ENTITLED "PARKS & RECREATION".

The hearing was opened on a motion by Councilman Shaak seconded by Councilman Gianforte.

The Administrator explained that the ordinance controlled the parking of vans and buses at municipal parks.

The hearing was closed on a motion by Councilman Gianforte seconded by Councilman Gorham.

Councilman Garruzzo seconded by Councilman Nolan introduced Resolution 18-103 for passage on final reading of the foregoing ordinance. Vote: Councilmen Garruzzo, Gianforte, Gorham, Nolan, Shaak & Visceglia; all aye. No nays. Passed.

Councilman Gianforte seconded by Councilman Gorham introduced Resolution 18-104 to authorize publication of passage and adoption in the Coast Star according to law. Vote: Councilmen Garruzzo, Gianforte, Gorham, Nolan, Shaak & Visceglia; all aye. No nays. Passed.

Mayor Nicol then announced that the time had arrived for the introduction and passage on first reading of an "ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER TWENTY-ONE OF THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF BRIELLE ENTITLED "ZONING".

Councilman Garruzzo seconded by Councilman Nolan introduced Resolution 18-105 for passage on introduction and first reading. Vote: Councilmen Garruzzo, Gianforte, Gorham, Nolan, Shaak & Visceglia; all aye. No nays. Passed.

Councilman Garruzzo seconded by Councilman Nolan introduced Resolution 18-106 to authorize publication in the Coast Star for a hearing to be held on August 27th, 2018, at 7:30pm at Borough Hall. Vote: Councilmen Garruzzo, Gianforte, Gorham, Nolan, Shaak & Visceglia; all aye. No nays. Passed. Page 66

Mayor Nicol then called for committee reports, but first he offered a comment on the Night Out Against Crime. He noted that both Councilman Nolan & Garruzzo had been preparing and serving food at the event. Sales of Councilman Nolan's food were 25% higher than sales for Councilman Garruzzo's cuisine; he found it curious. Mayor Nicol then recognized Councilman Gianforte who had report.

Councilman Nolan advised that Certified Life Coach Therese Kaminski would host a workshop on August 26th.

The Board of recreation's Christmas in July had been a great success and the Brielle Dash was scheduled for September 7th. A concert in the park would be held on August 28th.

Councilman Garruzzo thanked everyone who participated in this year's National Night Out. Councilman Garruzzo cited the presence of the Monmouth County Fire Marshal's Fire Safety House Trailer. The realistic interactive setting provided training on how to recognize potential fire hazards as well as information on how to survive a house fire. Councilman Garruzzo also thanked Brielle's own Fire and First Aid units for their participation and permitting local children to explore the vehicles and equipment. Councilman Garruzzo noted that he would be remiss not to thank Brielle recreation for cooking and supplying the DJ who did a fabulous job engaging the crowd. The feedback has been positive, and the Police Department looks forward to next year's event.

Councilman Shaak cited the Valley Road project that would complete the repaving begun last year in phase. Work would begin in early September and should take about two weeks to complete; he asked area residents to be patient during the work.

Council Shaak also cited the NJDOT work on the Ashley Avenue overpass that would begin around September 16th and continue into next year with a scheduled completion date of June 27th, 2019. During the summer months there would be no lane closures to avoid traffic disruptions.

Councilmen Gorham & Visceglia having no reports, the meeting was open to the public.

Charlotte Madison, 206 Homestead Road that the trash dumpsters at the Waypoint had yet to be screened in compliance with the Planning Board Resolution and she presented photographs to the Council. Mayor Nicol said he would direct the appropriate municipal agents to investigate the matter.

Ms. Madison also noted the vacant lot at 623 Green Avenue that was not being maintained. The lot was overgrown, and nothing was done unless she or her neighbor complained. She felt it should be on a maintenance schedule. She also noted that, when it was mowed, grass clippings and debris were blown into the roadway and left there.

The Mayor directed the Attorney to review the matter and make a recommendation on how best to resolve it. Page 67

Adrianne Sinclair, 704 Schoolhouse Road, voiced a concern over speeding on the road. She was deeply concerned as she had small children and worried about their safety when they played outside. Having posted her concerns on Facebook, she discovered one hundred residents from Schoolhouse and Rathjen Road who shared her concern. Ms. Sinclair noted that the Police had made an effort and had placed radar and the electronic Speed Sign on Schoolhouse Road, but the problem continued.

Mayor Nicol advised that he was aware of the problem and had discussed it with Chief Palmer who promised an increased police presence in the area. Councilman Garruzzo added that Traffic Safety Sergeant Mechler had spoken with her husband and was seeking ways to improve the situation. Councilman Garruzzo did note that speed bumps were not viable due to the nature of the road and the police had twelve such locations to patrol, but every effort would be made to ameliorate the problem.

Kenneth Lackey, 624 Rankin Road, stated that his street suffered from the same problem with speeders and he asked if speed bumps could be utilized at his location as the roadway was flat. He also noted that the Speed Sign was ineffectual as the majority, some ninety percent of drivers, were cognizant of the speed limit and observed it, but there was a minority who seemly didn't care and continued to speed. Turning to enforcement, he noted that the Police tended to be helpful to the residents and appeared reluctant to give tickets.

Councilman Garruzzo interjected that they gave warnings, and, in the case of repeated offenders, summonses were issued.

Thomas Stuhrmann. 106 Ocean Avenue advised Council that this was the first summer his section of the borough had been "noise free". He attributed this to the Planning Board Resolution that banned exterior amplified music and he thanked the Council and the Board for that relief.

However, the Waypoint continued to ignore a June 15th mandate to replace the patio with landscaping and in fact, despite their statements at the Planning Board meetings that the patio was not a service area, they continued to utilize it for that purpose. Mr. Stuhrmann recognized that the matter was being litigated, but he asked what could be done.

Attorney Montenegro informed him that, if he had certain knowledge of the violations he should report them to the Zoning Officer for action. Mr. Montenegro added that a summons could be issued for each day of a continuing violation.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:49 pm on a motion by Councilman Gianforte seconded by Councilman Nolan.
